MY PRIVATE LIFE

Stanford white, architect & close friend of Saint-Gaudens (my creator), loved me so much that he wanted a large one of me for his garden. Later the artist made a couple hundred table-top versions of me for people's homes.



That's me! Over 6' tall at white's house.
I'm not 100% certain, but it memory serves
me right, I wasn't painted or covered in gold
leaf. The color I am today is most likely
my original color.

MY JOURNEY

There are different versions of me-Bl64small, gilded bronze & copper-hing all over the country in different collections and museums. Right now I'm strictly speaking about my tales as a cement goddess! This cement version of me (the one here at the Amon carter) has seen quite a boit.

1928-After decades in White's garden, my body was repaired and at least two casts we're made from me. (I like to think of them as my daughters.)
One lives at the Met in NYC & one at Bass Hall in Ft. Worth.

1928-Later that same year I was moved to the Museum of the City of New York until the 705. Some years I received more attention than others.



1981 - I became part of the Amon Carter family, and I rested my bones for a few years.

1987- I visited the Gilcrease Museum and lived in their gallenies for 7 years.

1994 - I was packed up, Shipped back to the Amon Carter, and kept a low profile in a vault until recently.



MY MAKEOVER

| had toget some workdone; you don't get to be over 100 years old without a little help from the professionals. A conservator who specializes in cument sculpture & Saint-Gauden's artwork (jackpotl) made me whole and strong again.



They took some X-rays to see what was going on inside of me. Luckily, my metal ar mature was solid and my cement not too shabby.

I'm not a featherweight; it took some heavy machinery and of couple of sets of hands to safely put my top and bottom together.
