I had some other children in for some boys and

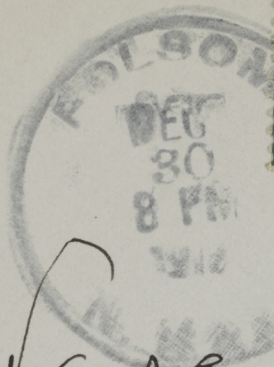
People looked them over well. They all had a
