meeting her so much.

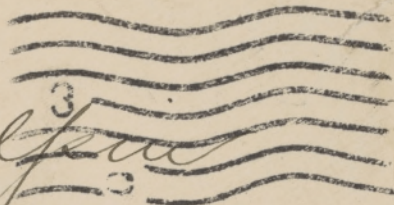
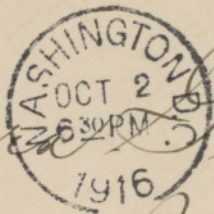
I really believe our last letters must
