Mother dear:-

Letter writing has hardly been in our line. We have both been utterly miserable all the time except to-day with the exception of a few hours another day.

The vibration on these fast boats is bad, combined with rolling and sometimes pitching, worse. But the sooner it's over the better. Five days and a half is bad worse we to have ten days of rough weather on a smaller boat, - Gosh.

We like the 2nd class O.K. There are more or less all kinds. Three girls from Balto one Dr. Magnussen nice young ones like ourselves. The 1st class full of rich Jews.

We are nearing France, reach Cherbourg at midnight to-morrow. + we are off at noon to-morrow. Glory be.

He will stay overnight at least at Southampton + if weather good may go down to Devonshire or Cornwall from there before going to London.
