My dear Mrs. White:-

Your two letters have come and I am glad to know that things are progressing with you.

Regarding the Library collection, I wish you ask Mr. Martin and Mr. Horne what they think about the choice. As I look over the list there are one or two changes that I would make. You found the portrait that I thought was Hartmann. It is so fine and I would like to see it included in place of the Tree Toad or the Pipes of Pan. One of those would be sufficient. Then the Head of Miss Felix is so fine which could take the place of The Chest (No.5.). I submitted some other portraits on my list which may be added at some future time. In adding these two there would be nine portraits (Nos. 17,19,24,36,37,38,39, and the two others) It seems to me that these would be enough in view of the possible addition of others at some future time. As to Nos 42,& 43 I leave which one of each of the series to Mr. Martin.

Have you heard no further news of the exhibition? When Lewis packed the press I wonder if he found the blankets that go with it. I never thought to mention these. If they are around would you send them? There were three or four when we used the press two years ago. And I wonder if you would care to sell or loan to me the Herbert Dennison "Treatise on Photogravure"? It is a small book

bound in a dark redish brown as I remember it.

My school is working out to my satisfaction in some respects. There were several people who wanted to work who could not give regular time to it. So we have decided that I shall be in Denver for one week each month for six months. I have outlined a course and begin on Jan. 21st. This will give me time between that will be very nice for me. I hope that it will mean that I can get to work at the photogravure soon.

Please let me know what Mr. Horne and Mr. Martin think about the Library collection, and I will write to Mr. Putnam regarding any changes. I would suggest mounting them all on uniform sized mounts, but perhaps I had best ask Mr. Putnam what they prefer. I can do this at once and he can write to you, or it would really be ~~simpler~~ more simple if you would write to him direct.

If you have a few more copies of the "News-Bulletin" I should be very glad to have them.

I do hope that Clarence Jr. is better. His being tired worries me for that is often a symptom of tuberculosis. Do not be frightened by my saying this for there may be nothing in it, and indeed I trust there isn't. I do wish, though that you would have his lungs examined. Dr. Alexander Miller is a fine specialist in this line. The boy has grown so fast, and has had so many colds, that he wants to be watched in this line.
