I am sorry if I conveyed to you the idea that your mounts were in an unrightly condition! It seemed a pity that any of the beautiful prints should be damaged to even a small extent.

Mrs. Fitch's son in law Mr. Curtis asked me yesterday if they could still be viewed and I understand Mrs. Fitch will be at Kodak Park this afternoon to see them. They will then be taken down and shipped to you. possibly tomorrow.

I wish I might give you some encouragement as to the manufacture of platinum paper. I am the head of the Order Department and have this morning talked with the man who assists the President, Mr. Stuber, who is in charge of emulsions. He will write you in regard to it. As I anticipate you will receive an unfavorable reply to your request I will say for your consolation that I have not sufficient influence to get Bromoil paper manufactured and have to send to England for it. Many bromoil workers have made requests but

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the idea seems to prevail that the demand would be too small to attempt its manufacture.
