As the particular print you saw was damaged on one corner I have made you a new print, which is the principal reason for the delay in sending them all. Platinum paper is a sunlight printing paper and just after my return we had five days of storm, which was very welcome as far as the country at large goes, but did delay me? Also, I am sending you a different print of the range, one you did not see and which I think is better than either that you did see. If you do not want it do not hesitate to return it.

The price of the Prairie is somewhat higher than the other two owing to the difficulty in making a satisfactory print and the difficulty of obtaining

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such an effect. This print is one of twenty six
of mine in the print Division of the Library of Congress
and there are only six copies. 33
