Dear Mr. Roux:-

For several weeks I have been intending to write to you to find out what was happening to my pictures, but my days are so extremely busy that I accomplish little outside my job at Boeing.

I think it very probable that you had difficulty reading my very illegible handwriting as I find several errors. I also have a few additions and slight changes to offer. I do not think I expressed myself to you clearly enough to make you understand one certain point. In the very first quotation you make it is the fact that the excessive humidity in extreme heat affects exposure requiring a shorter exposure under the extremely humid conditions whereas the same degree of heat in a dry climate requires a normal exposure. As I find several things to change I am writing on a separate sheet the part of your copy which is in quotation. I think this will come in better sequence and will hold together better. You may wish to shorten it. I may add here also that for many years I have been a user of Mallinckrodt chemicals and always mix my own solutions.

The formulae referred to in my first letter are both by the Defender Co. I give them with this, on the enclosed sheet.

Your layout is very attractive and I hope the whole will appeal to the Mallinckrodt Co. If there is anything further you wish I shall be glad to do all I can and I hope that I have now cleared up the uncertain points.
