As you know, I had a call not long ago from Mr. & Mrs. Clark, and we had quite a talk about Boeing and all that it has done. I am always interested to hear about because for two years, I practically lived in the factory. Mr. Clark has very kindly sent me word about the Boeing negative file, as I had asked him if had any idea if the negatives of 1942-1945 were still in existence.

He kindly looked the matter up, talked with Mr. Divinia, and wrote me all he found out. I am interested that you are having a 50th anniversary next year, and that the negatives are still in tact.

I do have some prints of the work I did while there, but there are a few that I should like to make better prints of someday. There is no hurry whatsoever about this. Perhaps I could borrow the negatives after you have prepared all you want for next year. One of these days, I would like to get together a retrospective exhibition of my work and this should include some of the special things I did while with Boeing. Probably I should come to Boeing to select those I should like to have.

At present I am just completing a book on the Navaho that has been in the works for nearly fourteen years. Not continuous work, ofcourse, for I do have to do many other things, but this has been a most interesting project. It goes to the publishers in a week or two, then it will be a year or more before it is on the market.

You will hear from me again at some future time, and in the mean time, my regards to you, and please tell Mr. Divinia when you see him, that I often think of those strenuous days during the war, and good luck for your 50th anniversary.
