Notes on the candidates - - -

Mr. Bibb is much interested in the preservation of prehistoric sites and cultures in the Acoma area. He has been instrumental in founding the Kow-ina Cultural Research Foundation which is devoted to archaeological studies in western New Mexico.

Mr. Boyer is an active worker in the field of amateur archaeology, is much concerned with the preservation of both historic and prehistoric sites. He is curator of the Kit Carson Museum in Taos.

Miss Blumenschein is a trustee of the Society. She is President of the Taos Archaeological Society which has carried on excavations and archaeological studies in that area.

Mr. Corley is a member of the Lea County Archaeological Society. An active worker in the field of amateur investigations he has helped organize societies in both Texas and New Mexico. In 1964 he was awarded the Societies' certificate as the Amateur Archaeologist of the Year.

Mr. Jackson is President of the Society. He has been active in all phases of archaeological conservation and is a member of the San Juan Archaeological Society.

Mr. Kemper is Vice President of the Grant County Archaeological Society. For years he has been actively engaged in the study of the ancient cultures of southwestern New Mexico.

Mr. Schroeder is an archaeologist of the National Park Service. As the author of many fine reports covering investigations by the Park Service he has added much to our knowledge of certain aspects of southwestern prehistoric cultures.

Mr. Thomas is presently a trustee of the Society. He is a teacher of General Science and Biology in the Santa Fe School System. He was a charter member of the Santa Fe Archaeological Society.

Mrs. Watson is Secretary of the Society. She is both a writer and lecturer on archaeological and ethnological material as relating to southwestern prehistoric and native cultures.

Mr. Warnica is a member of the Llano Archaeological Society. In 1963 he received the award of the Society as the outstanding Amateur Archaeologist of the Year for work carried on the preceeding year.

Sunday, there will be a combination archaeological and historical tour from the pit house sites on the north Hondo Valley Ridge to Fort Burgwin where we will have a picnic lunch, not supplied. After lunch the group will go to Picuris Pueblo (tour by Dr. Herbert Dick), then to Dixon and its two torreones. The trip will end at the San Juan Pueblo where the excavations of San Gabriel del Yunque are located.
