We can either relocate and rerun the shot of the Indian woman, or (look out, here comes a request for a favor) perhaps you could forward us another we could use. I think it's safe to say we can find bigraphical material for accompaniment, but of course we'd also be delighted (look out again) with a few words from you.

I might also call your attention to our Oct.-Nov. *74 issue, which contains an interview with Berenice Abbott, who would seem to be a contemporary of yours, and likely an acquaintance. I hope you enjoy reading our efforts.
