FREDERICK W. M. JANNEY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19 — Frederick Wistar M. Janney, director of personnel of the Central Intelligence Agency, died yesterday of a heart attack while playing squash at the Metropolitan Club. He was 59 years old.

Adm. Stansfield Turner, the Director of Central Intelligence, eulogized Mr. Janney as a “caring, highly intellectual gentleman, whose broad experience touched nearly every aspect of the agency.”

Mr. Janney attended Princeton and was a Navy pilot in World War II. He joined the C.I.A. in 1948. He was a Navy pilot in World War II. He is survived by his wife, the former Mary Draper, and two sons, Peter W. Janney and Christopher D. Janney.

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
