So much time has gone by since the Enduring Navaho was sent to you that I am getting anxious to know if it arrived safely. I don't expect a decision until you have had time to evaluate the book, but I do want to know that it reached you.

I took it down to THE CENTERLINE, Inc. a store here run by two young architects, to be properly packed. The Railway Express Co. picked it up on April 11th. While I know the Express Co. can be very slow sometimes, this seems an excessive length of time and if you have not received it, I must start a search at once. The fact that I have had no answer to my letter of April 9th, makes me sure that you are, or have been away.

As the complete work including the portfolios of reproduction prints etc. weighed 60 lbs. it would have meant three packages if sent by mail. In the awful event that you have not received it would you wire me so that I may take this up with the Express Co. immediately? I have an feeling that you may have gone to Europe or somewhere far away!

Probably in the next mail I will receive a letter, but I feel I must send this at once.
