Dear Mrs. Morris:-

What a coincidence that you should be at the U.T.P. when my book was in progress! First I want to thank you for catching my error about Mr. Stolworthy. Someone certainly told me that he was no longer living, and I recently supposedly verified that with someone here in Santa Fe. It all goes to show how many times one must check every thing. Was it possibly Mrs. Stolworthy who haddied? I remember that the oldest boy as killed in a car accident.

I also remember picking up either your father or your uncle on the road from Kayenta into Shiprock. He had been prospecting for uranium and his car broke down and he was standing the roadside in the middle of nowhere waiting for someone to come along. This must have been in the early 1950s when I had started working on this book. I know that Mrs. Forster and I had been in to Red Rock and we must have seen you as a little girl! I remember both your father and your uncle very well. And when I was in San Antonio working on my Rio Grande book, one of the Magees came up to speak to me when we were visiting the Alamo.

I have just learned that the Window Rock Fair is very early this year, Aug. 30 - Sept 2nd. Dont you think it might be a good idea to put an add about The Enduring Navaho in the issue of the Navajo Times that comes out at Fair time? This being the centennial year there are many activities going on and there will be many added visitors. And perhaps another add at publication time. From what a number of Navaho People have told me during the past two years we are ging to have a good many Navaho buyers. Various people come through Santa Fe, and many of them drop around to see us.

After eighteen years of work on this, I will be a great relief to have the publication finally accomplished. It has been a long wait. Miss Forster is very frail and I am bumping around on crutches,

but I am a lot better and hope to be off of these before too long. I am able to do darkroom work, and am working very hard now preparing prints for the Fort Worth show.

I am looking for Mr. Hudspeth to show up perhaps this coming week and will pass on all regional information I have which could be of help in your department.

I hope you are sending me a copy of the fall catalogue which Mr. Wardlaw mentioned in his last letter. I have not yet seen it and would like very much to have one.

With the best of wishes and again my thanks for your corrections. I am lucky that you were where you are for this would have been a very bad error, and I hope that Mr. Stolworthy sees the book for as you probably know my early picture of the Red Rock Trading Post will be in it with Mr. Stolworthy at the counter.
