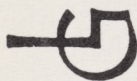

diagnose illness. Also
used to locate property
which has been lost
or stolen.

Also used for finding
water when in a
strange territory.

Most Navaho accept
ritual without question
a few admit it is
not always successful.

Ceremony belonged to
the Gila monster who after
the emergence, taught the ritual
and songs to one of the people, who in turn,
was to instruct others. The Gila monster
is believed to see everything that occurs
and to keep track of actions of all people.
Hand Tremblers are of both sexes.

For diagnosing illness the ritual is more elaborate with pollen sprinkling, gifts to the Gila Monster & Songs, always four songs. For lost or stolen articles the trembling weight leads the trembler to the location one hears the far away voice of the Gila.
