Thank you so much for your kind letter and for the trouble of sending me the file of clippings. I am very pleased to find so many reviews and to find them all so favorable. And I am particularly pleased that to date no scientist has written to tell me of something wrong! I tried hard indeed to make the text as accurate as possible, and I hope I made the grade.

There are a few reviews I have had that I do not find in your file. The one I value most is written by Dr. Clyde Fisher in the May issue of NATURAL HISTORY.

Did I not send you one of Jan 18, in our local paper? There was one in the New Republic some time in Feb. I think, I do not have the date. A mention of the book in a review of an exhibition I had in Rochester N. Y., in the Rochester Democrat and Chronicle, Feb. 15. One in the Gallup, New Mexico Gazette.
