Howard Griffin, Noted Author-Lecturer, Is Hit By Lightning

John Howard Griffin, internationally known author and lecturer, was hit by a bolt of lightening on Friday night in Thomas Merton's mountainside cabin in Gethsemane, Kentucky. Griffin was knocked from his wheelchair while typing during an electrical storm and was on the floor unconcious when monks from the Abbey in the valley below came up to check on Griffin after he failed to answer their call on the telephone. It is thought the rubber tires on the chair may have saved his life.

Griffin was chosen to be the biographer of Thomas Merton by the <u>Catholic Church</u>. Griffin chose to do his writing in the cabin made famous by Merton. Merton, a Trappist Monk, died of an electrical shock in Bankok, Thailand about two years ago.

Griffin was treated in the Gethsemane Hospital and returned to the cabin on Sunday. He is having some troubles with memory, but doctors think this will disappear in a few days.
