

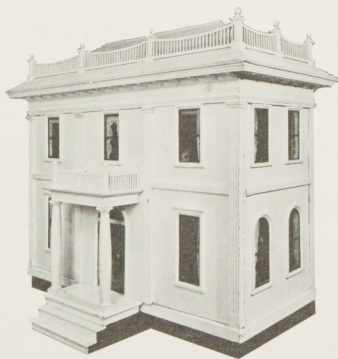
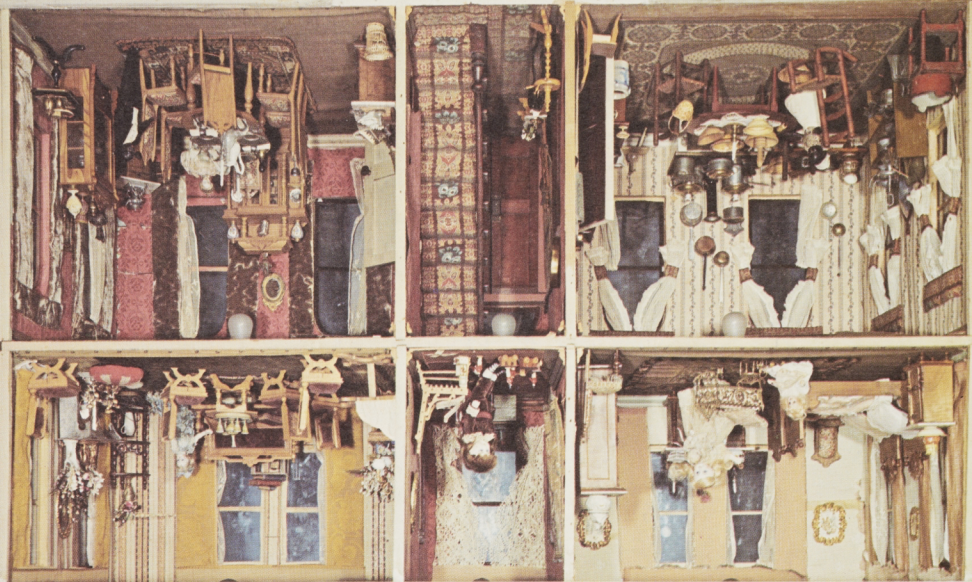

THE JAMES DOLLS' HOUSE 1885

This house is another instance of a dolls' house descending through the female line of the family. Made by an estate carpenter on the Hudson River, the enormous house with its columned porch and balustraded roofline reflects the lavishness of Victorian New York's summer cottages.

Inside, the furniture is in keeping with the rich and heavy suites for formal rooms imported from Germany. The dining room is splendidly appointed, and the kitchen full of finely made equipment. The large sets of furniture are of about the same date and were added by the Museum. They once belonged to Marie Constable and came from her dolls' house.
