The Dorr Foundation. So many of the people who had seen it were enthusiastic about it that I visualized the Centurians who I knew anyway, would also be at least mildly enthusiastic. I received no acknowledgment of the gift and on making inquiry, your librarian told me it had been received and a slip put in for its acknowledgment to come to me, I think by yourself but it had evidently been "lost in the shuffle."

It is obviously a very embarrassing thing for a man to speak of the work of his wife, but you might be interested in knowing that the exhibit entitled, "The Family of Man, an Exhibition of Creative Photography Dedicated to the Dignity of Man, conceived by Edward Steichen", opening next week at the Museum of Modern Art, contains some pictures made by Mrs. Dorr. The 400 pictures in the exhibition were chosen from some 50,000.

I am also enclosing a brochure and some comment by other people, although the last thing I would impugn a Centurian for is that his own opinion would be swayed by the opinions of others. To any of the clubs to which I belong, except the Century, I would not dare to make the comment that I am making to you. As Arthur Rushmore states, many very marvelous people only regard it as "another book."

I am sure if you have taken the time to read through this letter, I owe you a drink.
