Dear Mr. Moe: Enclosed is a report of the work I have done in connection with my Guggenheim Fellowship. It does not include a financial accounting of the funds that I have received but I could send you such an accounting if you want it. If the United States had not become involved in the world war I would apply for a renowalloof any Collowship but I feel that my training as a photographer, in chemistry and in medicine can be put to a more useful national purpose in some other connection. Because of defense and war needs there will probably be such a shortage of photographic materials and equipment that the continuation of my project will become impossible. Also of course I may be grafted. Because of this situation and its exceptional character I wonder if you could accept an application for a renewal of my fellowship to be considered after the conclusion of the war. I realize that this is a rather extraordinary request and that it may not be considered sound policy to grant it. In case, however, that you feel that you can give it some consideration I will state briefly how I would like to continue my project. I should like to spend April and May photographing birds in Illinois in order to get pictures of many of the common early nesting birds of this region which I failed to get Mast spring. June, July and August I should like to spend in Maine, a state I am very familiar with and in which I have done a good deal of photography.
