

Dear Mr. McAlpin,

As a parent representative on the Princeton Day School Upper School Assembly Program Committee I am writing to request some advice and/or your assistance.

As members of The Princeton Art Museum my husband and I are looking forward to the rest of the Stieglitz Memorial Lectures on Photography that you are so generously sponsoring. The last lecture, which is to be given by Eliot Porter, is particularly fascinating since Mr. Porter represents, to my mind, not only a superb photographer but also a man dedicated to the preservation of nature. As such, I know he would be a most interesting and inspiring speaker to the Upper School students at Princeton Day School.

The Upper School has a good group of very eager and budding photographers (including our oldest son) and with their own darkroom at the school and a visiting lecturer every week in Creative Photography this seems to be shaping up as a most interesting means of expression.

After a most fruitful and involved "Earth Day" last spring Princeton Day School students became much more aware of how they could help prevent pollution, preserve natural areas and how much more education the general public needed in this area. The students have created an Ecology Office at school and are planning many activities -- lobbying for a bicycle path to school, sending representatives to the local Sierra Club meetings and starting an aluminum can recycling collection.

Our budget for Assembly speakers is a very limited one, however this is a most involved and aware group of students and I am sure Mr. Porter would find them a tremendously receptive audience. Therefore, any advice or assistance you can provide to persuade Mr. Porter to speak to our

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students while he is here in Princeton would be gratefully appreciated.
