Recently there has been great concern expressed both by public officials and in the press about the effect of the organo-chloride insecicides on the environment but at the same time a denial that they have any effect on human health. If they do have a harmful effect on humans the action is difficult to prodve because of the subtilty of their action and because the chemicals become sequestered in the body. Experiments with mice and other animals will never be conclusibe. However, I suggest that injurious physiological effects of the these chemicals, if they are produced, will only be established by a prolonged study of the correlation between morbid symptoms and organo-chloride concentrations in biopsy materials and tissued excised during surgery. Such a study would be very valuable to an understanding of the effect of these non-biodegradable substances on human health and life. The study would entail the enlistment of many surgeons in a cooperative effort involving the sending of specimins to a central laboratory, financed by a foundation or a medical school, for analysis. I think it is only the better part of wisdom for people to try to find out just what they are doing to themselves as well as the environment by the careless and thoughless dissemination throughout the world of noxious chemicals. What's your reaction to this idea?
