BACKGROUND

The International Fund for Concerned Photography, Inc. was born of respect for the images of the past, anxiety for the photographic direction of the present, and concern about the existence of true documentation of the future. Perhaps concerned photography was best defined a half century ago when the pioneer documentary photographer Lewis W. Hine wrote: "There were two things I wanted to do. I wanted to show the things that had to be corrected. I wanted to show the things that had to be appreciated."

Established in 1966 as a nonprofit, educational organization in memory of Werner Bischof, Robert Capa and David Seymour ("Chim"), ICP aims to:

promote and sponsor photography as a medium for revealing the human condition;

make grants and purchase awards to assist photographers of any age or nationality whose work shows personal commitment;

rescue notable and historically important photographs and bring them to public attention through exhibitions, publications, films, television and other media;

establish living photographic archives with a central file and retrieval system available to all disciplines seeking this material;

establish an International Center of Photography for the creation of exhibitions, teaching and publication programs, and to house a permanent print collection, a photographic reference library and bookstore;

cooperate with existing cultural and academic institutions to exchange information on important photographic works and to foster greater accessibility of such works to the public;

encourage the creation of a world-wide network of autonomous national affiliates of ICP, each with its own museum and program.

The ICP Travelling Exhibition Program has circulated many of these exhibitions widely within the United States, Canada, Europe and Japan. A major photographic exhibition by the Metropolitan Museum of Art, BEHIND THE GREAT WALL OF CHINA, with Cornell Capa as Guest Director and ICP collaboration, opened at the Metropolitan Museum one week prior to President Nixon's historic visit to China in 1972. The exhibition is now being circulated by ICP throughout the United States.

The first nine in the series include William Albert Allard, Cornell Capa, Henri Cartier-Bresson, Bruce Davidson, Brian Lanker, Donald McCullin, Eliot Porter, W. Eugene Smith, and Roman Vishniac. 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THE FUTURE

The success of ICP programs indicates that it is now time to create an ICP - INTERNATIONAL CENTER OF PHOTOGRAPHY 'to house not only our present ongoing activities but also to bring into being those now pending for lack of space, funds and staff. Such a center/museum to create exhibitions, develop teaching programs, organize major archival resources and publishing programs-- devoted exclusively to photography-- would be the first of its kind.

The Center will also make possible an archival network, a permanent print collection, a photographic reference library and bookstore, original print collections and portfolios of major photographers for acquisition by institutions and private collectors; lecture series on a nationwide basis, an international travelling exhibition program, and a central meeting place for interdisciplinary dialogues in the visual world, the humanities and the sciences.

Exhibitions, publications and teaching programs will comprise the Center's major source of income. With foundation and private start-up support, the ICP Center can develop a viable, largely self-sustaining program within a few years.

The Center will be housed in a Manhattan location which offers easy access, visibility and sufficient space to accommodate the entire ICP program. It will add an important dimension to the cultural and educational life of New York City and help realize a primary mission of photography which, in the words of Edward Steichen, is "...to explain man to man and each man to himself."

ICP is a nonprofit educational organization; contributions are deductible for income, gift or estate tax purposes in accordance with federal and state tax laws.

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
