UTSA begins shuttle service for students

Stuck on west campus and need to get to south or north campus during the middle of the night or a rainstorm? UTSA has purchased a 15 passenger van to shuttle students around campus during the evenings and during inclement weather. Designed with the dorm students in mind, the van operates every evening from 5 p.m. to midnight.

Students who need a ride to the dorm or a different area of campus can either wait for the van at the lobby of the campus police station or

call from an emergency phone to have the van come to wherever you are.

The van will go from the library to the University Center, circulate the parking areas in the north part of campus and return to the dorms.

The van (white with the UTSA logo and a rotating blue light on top) will be available during cold and rainy days also to help students get where they need to without getting soaked or frozen.

The service begins Monday, March 2.

College Bowl at '87 Spring Honors Conference

"The Ancient Age of Greece" is the theme for the fourth annual Spring Honors Conference sponsored by the honor societies at UTSA, Alpha Lambda Delta and Alpha Chi. The conference, which features workshops, films and a college bowl, will be held Friday, March 6.

There will be three workshops throughout the conference. Dr. Steven Kellman, professor of comparative literature, and Dr. Eileen Lundy, associate professor of English, will discuss "Scenes from Greek Drama" from 9:30 to 10:15. Also, Dr. David Schneider, professor of psychology, will discuss "Truth in Greek Society" during the 9:30 sessions.

The second set of workshops, scheduled for 10:30 to 11:15, will focus on "Right and Wrong in Ancient Greece: The Greeks and Ethics" and "Socrates, Plato, Aristotle: Progression in Science". Both workshops feature large panels which will examine Greek ethical ideals and science.

The third set of workshops (from 12:15 to 1 p.m.) will focus on Athens. Schneider will examine "Athens in the Fifth Century: The Recipe for a Golden Age" and Charles Field and Dr. Richard Tangum, professors of art and architecture, will discuss "Art and Architecture of Athens."

Films will be a featured element during the day, all of which focus on Ancient Greece.

Qualifying rounds of the College Bowl competition will be conducted

during the conference. At 1 p.m. the two final teams will compete. In the final round, the questions will deal with Ancient Greece; participants will receive a suggested reading list before the conference so they may prepare for this round. In the qualifying rounds, the questions and

News briefs

An international accounting course, combining study and a field trip to the Orient is being offered through the Division of Accounting and Information Systems at The University of Texas at San Antonio.

The course offers three hours of college credit or 45 of the continuing professional education hours necessary for the upkeep of public accountancy certification. Course requirements include class meetings on campus; required reading materials; the field trip to the Orient featuring meetings in Hong Kong, X'ian, Beijing, Guilin, Pagan, Bangkok, Burma, Singapore and Nepal; a term paper; and advance registration for course credit during the spring semester.

Cost for the 31-day course, May 16 through June 15, is \$5,940 from Houston. Options are available to shorten the field trip portion of the course to 14 days at a cost of \$2,879. Visits to regional industries will be made in eight cities, including meetings with Big Eight accounting firm offices in each country. Deadline for registration is March 2 and for payment is March 16.

Maxine Greene, professor of philosophy and education at Teachers College, Columbia University, will present the first Distinguished Lecture in Education on March 10, 1987 at 7 p.m. in The University of Texas at San Antonio Recital Hall.

UTSA has initiated the Distinguished Lecture in Education to address increasing national and local interest in the quality of education and potential education reform.

Professor Greene is well known for her knowledge in philosophy, literature and the humanities that she brings to education. She has been published in the most prestigious academic journals, and has authored several books, including *Existential Encounters for Teachers*, *Landscapes for Learning*, *The Public School and the Private Vision*, and *Teacher as a Stranger*.

Greene will discuss "A Nation Prepared: Teachers for the 21st Century", the report of the Carnegie Task Force on Teaching as a Profession.

News briefs

The accounting firm of Grant Thornton presented the division of Accounting and Information Systems at UTSA with a \$5,000 check during a recent ceremony here.

The funds will be used to provide research grants for faculty members, to pay the annual dues of professional organizations for faculty members, and to augment current division travel funds for faculty, according to Dr. James F. Gaetner, director of the Division of Accounting and Information Systems.

This is the third time the international accounting firm has presented funds to the University, and according to Gary Maxwell, Director of Recruitment for Grant Thornton, this recent presentation is a continuation of the firm's support of UTSA. Maxwell noted that Grant Thornton currently employs approximately 15 UTSA graduates throughout its Texas offices, and indicated that "UTSA's accounting program is one of the best." He added that half of this current gift was contributed by

the Grant Thornton management group and Grant Thornton employees who are UTSA graduates. The remainder of the presentation came from the Grant Thornton Foundation, which matches, dollar-for-dollar, amounts raised within the accounting firm.
